IMPORTANT NOTICE

This is a MAILED BALLOT ELECTION. You may vote the enclosed ballot and RETURN IT BY MAIL or deliver it to the District Secretary of Reclamation District No. 1000 using the RETURN ENVELOPE provided. You should return your voted ballot as soon as possible.

Return or mail your ballot to the District Office by 7:00 pm on November 8, 2022. Ballots not returned or postmarked before November 8, 2022 will not be counted.

VOTER INFORMATION AND INSTRUCTIONS

Included with the ballot are: 1) Voter Information Pamphlet, including instructions on how to cast your votes, 2) a Legal Representative Form (Form A), in the event that you have been authorized by the landowner of a parcel to cast the votes for that parcel, 3) a Return Envelope. When completed, the ballot must be mailed or hand-delivered in sufficient time to be received by 7:00 p.m. November 8, 2022. **Ballots received after the deadline will not be counted**. The return envelope is to be completed as indicated on its face and must bear your signature where indicated.

HOW TO RETURN YOUR BALLOT:

Step 1. Read and mark your ballot indicating which candidate(s) you wish to cast your votes for. There are three Trustee's seats open. You have been assigned a number of votes based on the acreage of your parcel. You may cast these votes for one candidate, for no candidate, or you may split your votes among multiple candidates. Your total number of votes cast must be equal to the number of votes assigned to you, as indicated on the top of your ballot. Mark the ballot by clearly writing in the number of votes you wish to cast for your candidates. Do not make any other marks of any kind on the ballot. For instance, if you simply put an "X" next to the names of a candidate, the ballot will not be counted. You must indicate your vote by using numbers next to the name of one or more candidates.

Step 2. Detach the stub from the top left portion of the official ballot. This is your receipt for voting.

Step 3. Place the marked ballot inside the RETURN ENVELOPE. If the property title lists more than one name, please read the AUTHORIZED VOTERS information below before you complete your ballot. Complete and sign the RETURN ENVELOPE. If the RETURN ENVELOPE is not completed and signed, your ballot will not be counted.

Step 4. Mail your RETURN ENVELOPE to the District. Return postage has been prepaid on the envelope. It is addressed to: Reclamation District No. 1000, 1633 Garden Hwy, Sacramento, CA 95833. This envelope may be sent by registered or certified mail if you wish, at your cost. The return envelope may also be delivered personally to the District at the above address.

If you failed to receive, lost, or destroyed your original ballot and would like a second ballot, contact the District at (916) 922-1449.

NUMBER OF VOTES:

Each voter is entitled to cast one vote for each dollar's worth of assessment valuation as shown on that assessment roll for all parcels owned by the voter, multiplied by the number of seats (3) up for election. The total possible votes have already been calculated, and may be found on your official ballot. Votes are allocated among multiple owners of the same parcel according to state law.

AUTHORIZED VOTERS:

To be qualified to vote in the election, you must be a landowner in Reclamation District No. 1000, or the legal representative of a landowner. Renters or leaseholders are not qualified to vote unless authorized by the landowner. It is not necessary to be a registered voter to vote in a California Reclamation District Election.

"Landowner" means any person shown as the owner of land on the last equalized assessment roll or otherwise known to be the owner of land by the District.

"Legal Representative" means an officer or other person or persons appointed to serve in that capacity by the board of directors of a corporate landowner or a person appointed to serve as such by a non corporate landowner.

PROXY VOTING

Voting by proxy is permitted under Sections 50704 and 50759 of the California Water Code. All proxies must be in writing; must name the landowner, the person granted the proxy, and the election for which the proxy is granted; and must be certified under penalty of perjury. Any proxy is revocable at the pleasure of the voting landowner until the ballot for that parcel is cast.

A proxy form is available upon request from the District, and can be downloaded from the District's website at https://www.rd1000.org/vote-by-proxy. Return your proxy form to RD 1000 in your Return Envelope, with your voted ballot.

VOTING BY LEGAL REPRESENTATIVES

1. Corporate and Partnership Landowners: A legal representative shall be presumed to have authority to cast all votes for the principal identified in the certification by including in the Return Envelope a certificate under penalty of perjury identifying the principal and the authority of the legal representative. Therefore, a general partner (not a limited partner) can vote the entire ownership of a landowning partnership by including in the Return Envelope a certificate under penalty of perjury similar in form and content to that provided for a legal representative of a corporate landowner. Forms of certificate for a corporate and for a partnership landowner for this purpose are enclosed. (See FORM A)

2. Guardians, conservators, executors, administrators and other persons holding land in a trust capacity under appointment of court may vote without obtaining special authority from the court. Such a guardian, conservator, etc. must still, however, present proof of their appointment in the form of a copy of letters testamentary or of conservatorship or guardianship from the court, or a copy of a decree of distribution in the case of a testamentary trustee, unless the ownership shown on the appropriate county tax roll already shows the name and capacity of the conservator, executor, etc. If not, please include a copy of the needed documentation in the Return Envelope.

VOTING RESULTS

A County-appointed Election Board will count the ballots. The three candidates with the greatest number of votes will be appointed as Trustees of the Reclamation District No. 1000.

Candidate Statements

Jag Bains

Jag has lived in Natomas with his wife Preet, and two children, Sahib and Rhea, since 2001.

In addition to his day job with Construction Management and Inspection Division, Sacramento County, Jag serves as a Trustee for RD 1000, and Vice President of the Sacramento County Association of Professional Engineers.
